Cardinals say Synod has given new life to 'being Church'

Speaking on Saturday after Synod members passed their final document and Pope Francis approved it, Cardinal Mario Grech, secretary-general of the Synod said, "For me, personally, this document is important, but there is a document that was not written, which is the experience" of synodality by all those who took part in the global process since its beginning in 2021.

"The experience during this year has been beautiful," he told reporters at the Synod's final news conference on Saturday. And now the final document will help support local churches as they "try to take on this style of synodality". "We have walked together and now we know that we have to (keep walking) together in the future. And that's, I think, the great lesson we could experience," Cardinal Jean-Claude Hollerich, relator general of the Synod said on Saturday.

"We not only have to teach the document, but we also have tried to give people the experience in order to become a real synodal Church on mission. Let's not forget" that sharing the Gospel is the ultimate goal of the multiyear process, he said. "We have not gathered just to look (at) structures of the Church; we have not gathered to make a battle between conservatives and liberals. "We have gathered to have a synodal church for all the baptised, a Church which fulfills, which listens to the mission it has received from Christ and tries to do that in everyday life," Cardinal Hollerich said.

The second session ended on Saturday with everybody "full of joy", Cardinal Hollerich said, and there was no visible sense of people lamenting that their position had not been taken into consideration.





Troubling Thoughts & Spiritual Growth: Stages of Faith



M. SCOTT Most people are familiar with James Fowler's six stages of faith. Similarly, M. Scott Peck introduced four stages of faith in his book The Different Drum: Community Making and Peace. He is the same author of the 10 million bestseller book The Road Less Travelled. If you are not already aware of the four stages, I'd like to share a brief introduction. The four stages offer insight into why, despite sharing the same beliefs, we sometimes misunderstand one another's perspectives. The following summary, provided by a website focused on troubling thoughts and spiritual growth, highlights these stages. As we read

through the stages it is advisable to think about at which stage of faith each of us might be and why. The images are my addition. This week's newsletter will cover stages three.

M. Scott Peck offers a four-fold model outlining the development of one's spirituality. This system is loosely based upon our psychological development from children into adulthood. As with most, if not all of these systems, it provides a means of charting individual social-psychological development from an I-centric world, to a We-centric world, and for some into an Us-centric view of the world.

Stage III: Skeptic-Individual

This stage roughly corresponds to Fowler's stage 4 (Individuative-Reflective). This is predominately the domain of what I sometimes call nous-gnosticism (a search of knowledge ruled by the logical mind and intellect).



A strong sense of self-reliance may help one transition from the previous stage, and in my view this is largely a healthy transition. Among the hall marks of Stage III is the serious questioning of all that one has learned to this point in one's life. This includes sources of authority and information. Part of this process includes the critical evaluation of one's religious system.

Agnosticism, and even atheism, are common philosophical beliefs while in this stage. It is common to become "non-religious" in this stage, and some persons remain so for the rest of their life. And some even fall prey to an overwhelming sense of apathy and cynicism.

Stage III is also dominated by the processes of the intellect. In our modern world, this is the stage of scientific skepticism and reliance upon the empirical method, in place of reliance upon authority figures and dogmas presented to us by others.



Spirituality will encounter a great pressure to change in this stage. Persons unable to free their mind of the limitations of the slide rule may well lose their sense of spirituality altogether. Those who retain a sense of spiritual beliefs and observances will be driven to find new ways of understanding old doctrines and dogmas. Simple, literal interpretations of religious dogma must first give way to a more subtle understanding of one's religious mythos, and then a means of integrating this with one's scientific understanding of our cosmos must be found.



My personal view is the seeking imperative of this stage, ultimately drives one to either begin transitioning into the next stage (Mystical-Communal) or to succumb to a sense of being lost and isolated in a cold, dark and uncaring universe. In this sense, this can be a very dangerous stage of spiritual development, for it may lead to opening doors to untold mystery and wonder, or it may close our hearts for the rest of our lives.

Car dealerships


