


Our weekend Institute is an opportunity to explore some of the major themes from our recent General Chapter. The major one, universally recognised and agreed to by all the Passionists who were present, is that we have no future without 'Passionist laity'.

There are many levels of Passionists partnership and association and each of them is important. Our founder was a 'no-nonsense' down-to-earth, practical spiritual guide and preacher. That characteristic appeals to ordinary people, and it is not difficult to recognise that added to those characteristics of his, hope, compassion, mercy and the recognition of God's overwhelming love, are gifts worth contemplating on and sharing with others.

There is great emphasis today on discerning God's will. Paul of the Cross did not focus on this. His (Passionist) spirituality called for us not to be inquisitive about what God is doing or what God wants, but to abandon or surrender ourselves to God's will, in the same way as Jesus abandoned himself in embracing the cross.

The Institute will operate by Zoom, and is spread over two half-days. There are some brief input or sharing sessions, and opportunities for discussion. The aim is to explore



further, the relevance of our charism not only for professed Passionists but for laity who associate with us in whatever way they do and who are attracted to (maybe called by) our spirituality. Often, we find Passionist laity reflect back to us, richer insights of our charism than we have recognised. Please consider joining us for this event.



Troubling Thoughts & Spiritual Growth: Stages of Faith



M. SCOTT Most people are familiar with James Fowler's six stages of faith. Similarly, M. Scott Peck introduced four stages of faith in his book *The* Different Drum: Community Making and Peace. He is the same author of the 10 million bestseller book *The Road Less Travelled*. If you are not already aware of the four stages, I'd like to share a brief introduction. The four stages offer insight into why, despite sharing the same beliefs, we sometimes misunderstand one another's perspectives. The following summary, provided by a website focused on troubling thoughts and spiritual growth, highlights these stages. As we read

through the stages it is advisable to think about at which stage of faith each of us might be and why. The images are my addition. This week's newsletter will cover stage four, the final stage.

Introduction to M. Scott Peck's Four Stages of Faith of Spiritual Development

M. Scott Peck offers a four-fold model outlining the development of one's spirituality. This system is loosely based upon our psychological development from children into adulthood. As with most, if not all of these systems, it provides a means of charting individual social-psychological development from an I-centric world, to a We-centric world, and for some into an Us-centric view of the world.

Stage IV: Mystical-Communal

This stage corresponds to Fowler's stage 5 (Conjunctive Faith). This is predominately the domain of what I sometimes call kardia-gnosticism (a heart-based search for knowledge).

This is a mysterious and paradoxical stage of spiritual development. The binary view of the world of Good vs. Evil, Right or Wrong, begins to dissolve into the realisation that between the world of Black and White is a startling spectrum of subtle Greys! Truth and Fact begin to be understood as belonging to different paradigms. It is not that one is Right and the other Wrong, but rather, they each have their own sphere of effect and meaningful application.

Community becomes increasingly important in this stage, and along side this, a sense of acceptance for others. Life and our roles and interactions with others all begins to be seen from a different perspective. The beauty, mystery, and deep interconnectiveness of the natural world is seen and appreciated. One begins to adopt what some call Unity Consciousness.



While one retains a degree of healthy skepticism in this stage, one is increasingly aware



of an apprehension of an underlying reality deeper than mere comprehension. The role of one's intellect is increasingly informed by the apprehension of one's heart. Forgiveness, mercy, compassion, and love form the lenses through which others are viewed. Judgement of other's transgressions and the desire to inflict punishment on others is set aside. The sense of separation between Other and Self soften.

In this stage one loves others as oneself. Attachment to one's own ego loosens. Forgiving one's enemies becomes more natural as one fails to see others as potential enemies. Those residing in Stage IV are often called Mystics.
