Come Away Day - Let Go and Let Gd



The first 'Come Away' day for 2025 was held on Wednesday (Ash Wednesday) with 25 participants, including eight new persons. There will be a short write up next week on a much appreciation day of reflection and sharing.

Ash Wednesday

(This is the reflection Tri shared at Mass on Wednesday)

The distribution of ashes today, draws us to the mystery of God's salvation not only for humanity but for all creation. In the tradition of the Church, the Lenten season, beginning with Ash Wednesday, is observed as a time of penance by fasting, almsgiving and prayer (giving more than the usual time to religious exercises).

Today, we hear in the Gospel about Jesus' teaching on these three acts of piety – fasting, giving donations and attention to prayer, which were critical aspects of Jewish religious life in Jesus' time. In his teaching, Jesus did not criticize the public exercises of these pieties. Rather, He criticized the publish display of private pieties.

Just as what had been said by Joel in the first reading: "rend your hearts, not your clothing" (Joel 2:13), Jesus' teaching on acts of piety is an invitation for his disciples, as well as for us, to return to God in the heart of our life; in the heart of creation, where we can see God's work of Salvation carried in the entire life of Jesus, his incarnation, death, resurrection and ascension.

Yes, Jesus is the word of God. This reflects God's creative mind. St John tells us, "All things came into being through this word, and without this word not one thing came into being." (John 1:3). In this way, Jesus is essential to Creation. In his incarnation, Jesus entered not only into humanity, but into the heart of creation, into the most basic and real thing of creation. Ashes distributed on us today remind us of the first created matter.

When living creatures appeared on the Earth, matter was alive. We know now that matter and energy are two forms of the same thing. The appearance of humankind marked the time when matter became conscious. The death of Jesus, the death of the only fully human, is when matter turned into a new and different form of matter, in order to be transformed at the resurrection of Jesus. The event of Jesus' ascension was the first time any matter returned to God.

The distribution of ashes, therefore, recalls a truth that God has done the work of salvation for me, for you, and for the whole of creation.

What do we learn from this? The reality of war in our time, particularly the war between Russia and Ukraine has caused so many deaths and so much suffering. Environmental pollution and global warming, threaten us more than ever. This reflects the disharmony between and among humans themselves; humans with the ecological environment; humans and the Cosmos. The message for today and the Lenten season is to search for reconciliation of any and every kind. How it can be found is up to each of us, depending on the circumstances of our daily life. Amen


Peanuts



In his homily last Sunday, Chris referred to some noteworthy wisdom from Chinese philosopher Lao-Tze


"Watch your thoughts; they become words.
