Michael has been mentioned in our weekly prayers since July 2020. He has had a long battle while always retaining his remarkable patience and good humour. Sadly for his family, although a release for him, Michael passed away gently just before 1.30pm on Monday, at Templestowe Bupa. Michael was 93. Most of his family were gathered around his bed. His youngest daughter Cate was driving from Mallacoota and was still about an hour away, but she spoke to

Michael by phone, just a minute or two before he passed away..

Erick had anointed Michael around midday and later we all said 'final prayers' which ended just as Michael breathed his last. Kevin Hennessy arrived soon after Erick and I left.

After almost 65 years together, this will obviously be a difficult time for Joan whose own health has suffered greatly in the past two years. Hopefully she can recover without the demands of caring for Michael, including holding on to his wheelchair! There is nothing Joan would not have done for Michael, as has been the nature of their marriage and family life. They have had an incredibly long association with Holy Cross and are official benefactors of the Passionist Congregation.

Michael's funeral will be held at Holy Cross on **Wednesday March 26th at 11.00am**. There will be a rosary the previous evening at **7.30pm**.

Paul and Linda Darbyshire were dating as teenagers and married at a young age. They have been at the heart of Passionist Family Groups in New Zealand for 31 years. They hosted Passionist youth in



Tree trouble



More than twenty years ago, a number of trees were planted by Denis Travers, in a wide circle, in the area that is now the entrée to the extended carpark. The last three of these (pictured above) were removed last Friday.

Two of them as can be seen in the photo, were terminally ill, and the other was beginning the same decline. In this condition, aided by our very dry weather, they served as a serious risk to people and vehicles, so we had to have them removed. There is some work to be done to grind out the base so the carpark will be level.

It is always sad to lose a tree, but it is something we are vigilant about, because many of our trees stand near where people walk and some are near where cars are parked. Once they reach a certain age, almost all trees, carry dead wood in their canopy.

Eucalypts are renowned for this and are often

referred to as widow makers, During storms or in strong winds, large branches can

drop, as we see around Holy Cross property quite often. 'Sudden branch drop' can also occur when things are still, so it is important for us to continually be on the lookout, as Peter Norman was with these trees, and it's a good idea to 'watch where you walk'.

There is firewood available where those trees were.

It can seem demanding, but we cannot apologise for keeping people safe. Your cooperation if approached, is very much appreciated.

Dear friends of Holy Cross,

We have gathered as many email addresses as we could find so as to communicate some important information to you. If you know others who would like to receive this and subsequent information, please pass it on and/or send their email address to Mayrose in the office: <u>hcc@passionists.com</u>

We are about to enter a lengthy period when our contact with each other will be very different from normal. Not only will we not be shaking hands and hugging each other; most of us won't even be seeing each other!

Along with many other dioceses, Melbourne Archdiocese has imposed a ban on public Masses and liturgical gatherings "until further notice". This could be weeks, but it is more likely to be months.

For the first time in our lives, we will be unable to attend Easter ceremonies next month. Provided physical separation takes place, we invite you to use the grounds to pray the 'Stations of the Cross' or to reflect in the St Gabriel shrine'. We will post some recommended 'Stations' that include thoughts from St Paul of the Cross.

The Holy Cross chapel will be closed until further notice because we need to ensure any public place is regularly sanitized. An exception will be made if there is a funeral or baptism and the numbers are few enough and those present are spatially separated.

During these coming weeks we will continue to look for ways to offer spiritual nourishment, mainly through the Holy Cross website, but perhaps also by email. If you have ideas and requests, please send them to us. We may not be able to meet all of them, but we will do our best. We will advise you of anything significant we have to communicate, or you can check the webpage: www.holycross.com

Chris is hoping we can do a Sunday Mass and homily by video. We will advise of that and send or post particular reflections, especially for Holy Week.

'Come Away' days

The days of spiritual nourishment will continue. The next 'Come Away' day is Monday April 6th. There will be appropriate physical space for and between individuals to comply with the advice from health officials.

Pastoral visits

There are restrictions on visiting many nursing homes and hospitals. Chris is unable to visit his Dad, which is a great sadness for him. There are aged and unwell people who regularly worship at Holy Cross. We want to stay connected especially with them but we need to be careful in arranging visits, to avoid any health risks. We have had offers from people willing to visit and to take communion. If you wish to have a visit and/or communion please contact Mayrose and we will do our best to arrange this.

Passionist Companions

The Passionist Companions will not meet as had been planned. In the meantime, we will post on the webpage and email appropriate reflections.

The Holy Cross Centre

Many groups have cancelled bookings they had in the coming months. The Centre is the community's major source of income so this is a challenge for us. Purchasing food for fourteen males from almost empty shelves, is also a challenge! We did have a few supplies of some items, but we have not been hoarding.

Our **YTU students** will have a week's break from lectures and then continue studies from home by video link.

Our Vietnamese postulants have two more weeks study before undertaking their IELTS exams on April 4th.

Joseph Inaba, our Japanese deacon will return to Japan on Monday 20th March, a little earlier than planned.

Sr Brigid has been advised not to travel to Vietnam yet so she will reside with us in 'The Tavern' for a few more weeks.

Bro Jerome will return next Wednesday from PNG for a month, to monitor his health. During the first two weeks he will be in self-isolation.
